Progress Praise Awards





Combined Cadet Force



This term has seen the launch of an RAF section of the Combined Cadet Force (CCF) at Etone. There are CCF contingents in over 400 secondary schools across the UK, offering young people a broad range of challenging, exciting, adventurous and educational activities.

The aim of the CCF is to enable the development of personal responsibility, leadership and self-discipline. The CCF unit is an educational partnership between the school and the Ministry of Defence. The CCF offers an exceptional range of exciting activities for cadets to enjoy. As well as exciting and adventurous pursuits, many of the activities offered by the CCF are focused on gaining new skills as well as improving; teamwork, communication, confidence and leadership.

Training at Etone will be split over; parade evenings, field days and occasional weekend camps and courses. Parade evenings will take place every Tuesday after school, once a week. This will provide the basic training across a number of different areas and skills, which are then enhanced during field days and weekend training camps, where cadets will spend longer periods of time developing a particular skill, or working towards a qualification.

There will be many opportunities to gain recognised qualifications in disciplines like first aid, and the chance to take part in national programmes like the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme. There are a number of different vocational qualifications and a residential leadership course.

Our new recruits have been involved in a rigorous selection process, starting with a letter of intent, asking pupils to explain why they would like to join the CCF and what they think they will gain by being involved in this exciting opportunity. Recruits that passed this stage were then invited to interview with the Contingent Commander A/Plt Off Mr G Hodgson, as well as having to participate in two evenings after school where the recruits were observed by the CCF's officers to see how they worked together individually and as a team.

Over the next week pupils who have been successful through the selection process will be receiving a confirmation letter of their acceptance onto the CCF programme.




The Globe Theatre

Accelerated Reader News



I personally was thrilled to see the Etone students showing the Etone spirit: not only were they impeccably behaved and well-mannered but it was clear by their reactions of laughter, dancing and panto style 'boos' that they fully enjoyed the experience.



Making the right choice

PC Rob Pedley arrived at our school to talk to us in an assembly about how one choice can change your life forever. He spoke to us about this by telling how he had the choice to either go and drink coffee with his friends during his time at the Alps, or to go skiing by himself. So by himself, he went skiing and placed his phone in his front pocket for easy reach. Whilst he was skiing, an accident occurred and he fell 240ft off a mountain, breaking his spine in four places, smashing nine ribs and puncturing both lungs – but survived to tell the tale! One thing that helped him to survive was the phone within his front pocket, which he reached for and managed to tell his friends, who called the emergency services. His life changed forever that day, in just a few minutes that would soon bleed to years. One thing us students admire him for is for continuing to be a police man and the way he takes time out of his life to educate students and adults alike about choices. One valuable lesson he taught was: the choices one make today, tomorrow, next week or next year will impact one for either a few minutes, a few hours, a few days, a few weeks, a few years or the rest of one's life.


Not only did he give us a valuable lesson in choices within life, but he also managed to educate us about choices – especially choices in something called Joint Enterprise - a common law legal doctrine that allays criminal liability to the participants in a criminal enterprise for all that results from that enterprise. This means the law allows several people to be charged with the same offence, even though they may have played very different roles in a crime. Joint enterprise can apply to all crimes. He gave us one example of someone stealing a bike – the person who steals the bike, the person who stands on lookout, the person who accompanies them and the one who comes up with the idea. Each of these will be charged due to stealing the bike – they all played a part. Linking back to choice, if you choose to accompany a crime you can still be charged because you were there and you were involved. Make the right choice.

Moreover, he linked the choices with the rise in knife crime. He helped us to understand the choices we make by giving another example: two groups are having trouble; there is a rivalry between them and suddenly... a fight occurs. By the end of the fight, one or two would be dead due to the devastating fact somebody carried a knife. PC Pedley told us that you are more likely at risk for carrying a knife.

Making the right choice

Overall, the main factor of this all travels back to one word. Choices. Choices can affect today and tomorrow and it is vital to think twice about the actions you are taking. If you know someone is planning a crime or a bad deed, report it – or your choices will haunt you. Make the right decisions and whatever you decide to do, make sure it makes you happy. Make sure it keeps you safe. Make sure it keeps others safe.




Sea Life Centre Trip




Etone Takes on Berlin



On the early hours of 8th July, 31 students gathered at Etone College to set off for three days packed with culture, history and experiences that we definitely won't forget. After six long and exhausting hours, we safely arrived in Berlin, dropped off our bags and were ready to start the day of exploring the city. We were soon navigating the streets and the complicated transport systems, mainly thanks to Mr Hope, our own personal tour guide.

Our first stop was Checkpoint Charlie, a significant part of Berlin's history as it acted as a secure passing during the division of the city following the start of the Cold War. After a short break for lunch, we guided our way past the glorious Berlin Cathedral, we made our way to the DDR Museum which painted a clear image of life in East Berlin under Soviet control. We were shocked to discover the appalling quality of life of the citizens, their lack of freedom and the power that Soviet's had over them, which amplified our understanding of the tensions during the 1960s. We finished our day with a thrilling trip to the iconic TV Tower, from which the views of the city stretched before us, we were able to locate popular landmarks from the Reichstag Dome to the Brandenburg Gate – some were even able to find an infamous Soviet Spy base which had a peculiar shape.

After a well-earned rest, we were able to start our next day, first stop: the Berlin Wall.

We were given a thorough tour of the remains of the wall, our guide detailed the devastating events that happened after the wall was built in 1961 and how lives were impacted by the tensions that occurred between the East and West. We were told the tragic stories of people who were directly impacted as they tried to escape the terrors of East Berlin, and the news that the youngest victim of this horror was just six years old was horrifying to us. We continued by visiting the Topography of Terror, and were intrigued by the reality of Nazi control and the measures they took to protect their ideology. We finished sightseeing on a lighter note, by visiting the Olympiastadion, an important part of Germany's history as it was used as propaganda for Nazi Germany but also how in recent years the stadium hasn't been used to fuel an ideology, but instead has become a vital part of Germany's society. After a short stop at the hotel, we set out for bowling, which was a compelling and rewarding finish to the day.

On our last day we began with a short shopping spree, Miss Dunkley and Miss Kelly-Smith were most excited to take on Sephora whilst Mr Hope was hoping to expand his collection of football shirts - and was not disappointed! Next we carried on our historical tour towards the Palace of Tears where we furthered our knowledge of the division of Berlin, the life for its citizens, and the fall of the wall in 1989. This was followed by a trip to the Stasi Museum, we were fascinated to see how the political police oversaw the lives of six million people and how they feared elimination from the police. On our way to the Holocaust Memorial, we passed the Brandenburg gate, a monumental part of the falling of the Berlin Wall but also a perfect picture opportunity. The Holocaust Memorial was a series of concrete blocks all different sizes, representing the many lives lost from the catastrophic actions of the Nazi Party. Our trip ended by a visit to the Reichstag building, where we once again were amazed by the magnificent architecture of Berlin.



After days of sightseeing, socialising and tasting the most popular dishes of Germany - including the currywurst which was highly recommended by Mr Hope. Moreover we were eager to spot all the different colourful bears dotted around Berlin, which totalled to fourteen bears! We also gathered bags full plastic bottles as we learnt about the eco-friendly approach to recycling in Berlin and we earned over €7! Early Thursday morning we set off back for England, a calm and quiet journey as 31 students were ready to return to the comfort of their own homes. Although we were exhausted, this experience has been an enriching and memorable experience and we're all very thankful for this opportunity.
