STUDENTS WIN LIFE-CHANGING MENTOR SCHEME

Four students from Etone College in Nuneaton have been selected to take part in a life-changing mentoring scheme with a world-class athlete mentor. The students have been chosen for the AQA Unlocking Potential programme, run by exam board and education charity AQA and the Dame Kelly Holmes Trust.

The young people will be mentored by former Paralympic Skiier, Anna Turney. Etone is one of 20 schools selected to take part in this year's programme AQA Unlocking Potential provides mentoring for young people aged 11 to 19 who have faced personal challenges or disadvantages. Students are paired with specially trained mentors who have competed at world-class sporting events including the Olympics and Paralympics - and have overcome their own significant personal challenges. Anna Turney will provide personal mentoring for the students over eight months to help unlock hidden attitudes and skills. They'll also help the students to deliver a social action project towards the end of the programme.

UNICO LIVE APP

West Midlands Police have been made aware of an App called "UNICO LIVE". The app is publicised as age restricted 12+ and designed for young people to upload videos of them performing, singing and dancing etc.; it has come to our attention that there is inappropriate content on the platform involving young people which is being investigated.



The content does not appear to be monitored and we urge you to raise awareness widely to increase

vigilance and reduce the likelihood of any child being sexually exploited.



If you're thinking about investing in a tablet or smartphone for your child this Christmas, there are a few things we recommend you check before gifting it to them.

The first thing you can check are the parental control settings for your broadband internet service provider. Most providers offer parental controls that affect the connection itself, rather than just individual devices – which means any device connected to your home network falls under their watchful eye. Both Android and Apple iOS have built-in parental controls that let you limit which built-in apps can be used, which third-party apps can be installed (based on age rating) and how in-app purchases are handled.

The students all came back enthusing about their experience at Warwick University, and they even won the prize for best music festival award. Here's what Kirsten Jones had to say about the day:

Warwick University was such an amazing opportunity for me and my classmates. We received the best music festival model award. We were made more confident by being able to widen our German vocabulary in all of the activities we did for example by doing interviews. We all had the opportunity to perform to other schools which helped our communication skills. We all were talked to by people who told us about their experiences at Warwick University, and we got to ask questions to widen our understanding of the courses we could be doing in a few years time. Overall, Warwick University was a wonderful opportunity and we loved our time there!

7X1 have continued to develop their partnership with Collège Charles Péguy in France this half term, by exchanging letters and Christmas gifts. Each class even created an interactive advent calendar for the other school to open each day in the run up to Christmas, with different cultural traditions, songs and phrases.



GCHQ TRIP

On Friday 22nd November a group of Year 10 German pupils attended an event in Birmingham which had been organised by GCHQ, the UK's main intelligence agency. They were fortunate enough to listen to a number of GCHQ language analysts share their experience of the job and how they got into that career, and also had a series of tasks to complete. The team were split up and given taster sessions in Korean, Arabic and Chinese, before coming back together to solve an international crime. All six pupils were commended for their team work and communication skills, and were even the first team to rescue their teacher who had been 'kidnapped'! All in all it was a fantastic and inspiring day, and certainly helped the pupils to discover how languages can open doors to future career paths.







CROSS CURRICULAR PARTNERSHIP

Cross Curricular partnership- Food and MFL worked collaboratively to provide students with the opportunity to practise the German art of making and decorating traditional Gingerbread houses and biscuits or lebkuchen.

The activity was run after school as part of the Food club and attracted a massive 22 students on one evening! Students made gingerbread using a traditional recipe then decorated their biscuits with icing and sweets. The sights and smells of the Gingerbread baking were reminiscent of the German Christmas markets!

There will be other exciting joint projects coming up soon-Buche de Noel making during the last

week of term and January 2020 will see our students celebrating Chinese New Year with lots of delicious food and other activities too!





Students were able to demonstrate an array of Employability skills during the recent Careers Day held in school. Year 9 students were tasked with building a sound structure using dowels and elastic bands. They worked in teams demonstrating great team work and collaboration. Many of the activities also involved problem solving, using students own initiative and being resilient-particularly when the structure was not stable and had to be modified and improved. The final challenge was to build a giant structure which combined smaller structures from each team. Students were guided during these activities by visitors from Wilmott Dixon.

Other activities included planning a new eco-friendly housing estate, discussing the impact of the new build on wildlife and the environment as well creating and delivering a presentation to explain the concept to prospective home buyers. Students also got to experience presentations from visitors to the school who worked within a range of different careers sectors- for example Engineers, Computer Aided Designers, Graphic designers and Construction engineers.







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On 24th October 2019, for the second time, we held a whole school Careers Day. Once again, the aim of the day was to inspire pupils' exploration of career opportunities and offer advice and guidance for their future career choices. Etone follows The Gatsby Foundations 'Good Career Guidance' which states that "good career guidance is critical if young people are to raise their aspirations and capitalise on the opportunities available to them. At Etone, we work hard to promote impartial careers advice and guidance to our pupils and our Careers Day covered many different genres of careers and encouraged aspirations for all.

The Careers Day was a huge success and pupils had a plethora of opportunities and wealth of information to assist with their future career choices when they finally leave Etone College. We are already very excited about hosting our 4th Annual Careers Fair on 19th March 2020 which will allow a further opportunity for pupils to meet with prospective employers, apprenticeship providers and further education establishments to discuss their futures and careers aspirations. We also look forward to running another careers day in the near future.





WHAT WE GOT UP TO

YEAR 7

Year 7 spent the day attending talks and workshops with a number of different companies including the Police and Fire Service and also discovered the world of manufacturing, hospitality and games design. Pupils were treated to a visit from a police car as well as demonstrations from the fire service, a web quest and designing a new computer game!

YEAR 8

Pupils in Year 8 took part in CCF workshops learning about the different aspects of the RAF and understanding more about being a part of CCF in school. Some pupils also had the opportunity to work with Wilmott Dixon, our Business in the Community partner, on some tailored projects.

YEAR 9

The West Midlands Ambulance service joined us for the day, offering demonstrations, techniques, careers advice and information about joining the service. Pupils were also able to take a look around the fast response vehicle and ask lots of questions about life as a paramedic. Pupils also received talks and information about roles in engineering and project design.

YEAR 10

Pupils were given lots of opportunities to spend working with representatives from local universities, landscapers, computer engineering and driving ambitions. Lots of skills were taught and advice given about all the different roles available to pupils should they wish to follow a career path into these areas.



YEAR 11

The theme for Year 11 was next steps and all pupils in school were given a Careers Interview with a member of the Senior Leadership team. They had to complete an initial form of their skills and aspirations before embarking on their interviews. These were highly successful and we have been able to direct pupils to opportunities that have since become available. Following the interviews, pupils were invited to attend groups of discussions with Coventry University, Newman College University, Driving Ambitions and a unique opportunity to discover studying abroad. The final task for Year 11 was to experience lift in Etone Sixth Form and ask lots of questions about their pending applications. A selected number of pupils were taken offsite to visit the University of Birmingham for an in-depth look at how a university operates and what they can expect.

YEAR 12 & 13

Year 12 pupils had experiences with university representatives, with a particular focus being on UCAS applications and university life expectations. There was also some sessions with engineering and RAF representatives as well as an opportunity to work on their personal statements. Year 13 were taken offsite to experience life at De Montfort University in Leicester with the focus being transition to university, time management and experiencing life at university.

BOOK TRUST



Library lessons began with a buzz of anticipation in the air as all of our year 7 and 8 pupils chose a free book from an exciting selection of 15 titles which were carefully selected by the charity Book Trust. Pupils spent their initial library lesson watching a video which advertised each book and they watched a selection of authors, book publishers, illustrators and pupils from other colleges who persuasively recommended each book choice. Our students then read book blurbs and looked at sample books to make their choices.

Authors such as Tom Palmer and Chris Priestly continued to feature in the selection of choices, with plots involving World War One which linked into Remembrance week. Doctor Who also featured alongside books featuring animals, football, drones, cyborgs, vlogging, drones and environmental concerns. Popular choices were Still Water by Chris Priestly, set in the midst of World War One. A young girl evacuated to a village encounters a girl in a secluded area called the Witches' Pond. Who is she? Is she real? Is she a ghost? And what – or who – is she waiting for? Another popular title was Animal Records by National Geographic Kids. Pupils were eager to read a book bursting with awesome animal facts. Do you know what the biggest animal is? The fastest? What about the grossest, the tiniest, the smelliest, the deadliest...this book has it all including bright photographic images. All of the books are quiz able through Accelerated Reader and many students are lending a huge selection of Book Buzz Bingo titles from the last four years which you can find in the library. Three books read and quizzed will earn a commendation and five books will earn a selection box at Christmas.

Amazingly, an Etone student also won one of the Book Buzz online competitions which students were encouraged to enter. Congratulations to Maariyah 8C1 who won a signed copy of one of the authors books alongside another set of three of his books!



KRISTINA 8P2

I chose the book Sam Wu Is Not Afraid Of Ghosts by Katie Tsang as it looked attractive and colourful. I am glad I chose this book as it is very creative with a decent amount of illustrations to build up your imagination. If you love books with graphics, different fonts and humorous ghosts, then this is the book for you!

DESIGN TECHNOLOGY: FOOD YEAR 7 HEALTHY EATING

This term Year 7 have focused on Healthy eating and have developed their skills well. They have considered, designed and created a packed lunch that meets the Eatwell guide recommendations. They were asked to consider a balanced diet and to select foods from each area of the Eatwell guide so that a range of nutrients were included within the packed lunch. Students discussed what healthier food choices were and prepared lunches for themselves to reflect this knowledge and understanding. The results were fantastic! Year 7 students also experimented with a range of healthy options when creating a rainbow layered salad, rice salad or pasta salad. Students created a layered salad jar and their creations looked attractively presented and most importantly tasted even better! They developed skills in dicing, slicing, peeling, chopping, bridge cut, the julienne technique, grating and boiling. Fantastic work Year 7!

Students have been respectfully engaged in Remembrance Day activities in the library. All pupils had the opportunity to look at a wall display of local areas affected by the Blitz and were stunned to discover they lived near affected areas and still recognised them. Students read the Blitz Remembrance booklet and recognised streets and roads that were a part of their daily lives. This brought home to them the tragedy of entire families lost during the bombings of Nuneaton, Bedworth and Coventry. Some pupils also consulted with family members to verify that they were linked to some names and were relatives. Furthermore, they were humbled by the Nuneaton Book of Remembrance which lists all fallen Nuneaton soldiers of World War One. Pupils respectfully researched the documents and also read replica copies of World War Two newspapers. Wall displays around the library also featured cross curricular information and posters relating to both World Wars including subjects such as science, food technology, maths, history, geography and life-long learning. Of particular interest was a typical week's ration for a family and also wellknown brands advertised during the war; such as Cadburys, Coca Cola, Birds and Kelloggs, which are still available today.
