Well, what another busy term it has been for Etone's Library, with so many events and celebrations of reading taking place: World Book Day, our Scholastic book fair and several competitions, to name a few. Pupils have now borrowed over 1,170 books during this academic year so far, and our most popular books at the moment are the 'Little People, Big Dreams' series.

Scholastic Book Fair



Etone Library recently held its second bookfair of this academic year. The fair ran from Thursday, 13th March until Tuesday, 18th March 2025. Parents/carers were invited into School to come along and browse, with refreshments provided. Pupils thoroughly enjoyed coming along to the fair and purchasing their chosen book(s). It was a great success with sales of over £370, earning us over £90 in rewards for Etone. These rewards can now be spent on new books for the Library. Our next fair will be held next academic year in November.



Shakespeare's First Folio Finale

As you will be aware from previous Reading Round Ups, Etone Library has been very fortunate to have on display 'Shakespeare's First Folio Facsimile'. The First Folio is the first published collection of Shakespeare's plays, produced seven years after his death, titled 'Mr. William Shakespeare's Comedies, Histories & Tragedies'. This edition grouped the plays into the iconic categories - comedies, histories, and tragedies - for the first time.






This first folio facsimile has visited 26 libraries across Warwickshire. Etone College is the only School that has had the privilege of hosting it. This has now been returned to Warwickshire School Library Service, ready for it to make its way to Shakespeare's birthplace in Stratford-Upon-Avon. During the time it was here, Etone pupils were invited to see the folio and annotate any section which had a meaning for them e.g. maybe the first Shakespeare play they read. They thoroughly enjoyed this experience, annotating their favourite sections and becoming a small part of history.




World Book Day – 6th March 2025


Mini Books

Design a National Book Token Competition





Oxplore Essay Competition 2025



Oxplore are delighted to announce the launch of the 2025 Essay Competition for students at non-selective state secondary school across the UK.

They are inviting students from **years 7-9** to write an **800-word response** and students from **years 10-13** to write a **2,000-word response** to the following essay question:

Do we have enough?

They are encouraging responses which approach these questions from a variety of perspectives – History, Philosophy, Politics, Economics, Science, Law or any other subject or discipline. Entrants just need to remember to answer the question!

All entries should be emailed to <u>oxplore@admin.ox.ac.uk</u> by **11:59 BST on 16th May 2025**. Please include your **name**, the **name of your school** and your **school year**.

Where to start:

Think about defining the terms of the question. Who is the 'we' about whom you are going to write? Is it humanity, the country, your community? And what is it of which we may or may not have enough?

Check out <u>oxplore.org</u> (The Home of Big Questions) – maybe <u>'Can money buy happiness?'</u>, <u>'Are humans ruining the earth?'</u> or <u>'Can we end poverty?'</u> might provide you with some interesting perspectives to pursue.





Criteria

- the relevance of points made to the essay title
- the development and structure of your argument, which considers multiple points of view and reaches a personal conclusion originality will be rewarded, though not at the expense of logic and plausibility.
- your inclusion of supporting evidence to build a persuasive account
- your clarity of language and expression as opposed to inappropriate use of jargon sometimes simplicity is good, as is brevity!
- your creative understanding of the essay title/task.

<u>Bali Rai – Author Visit</u>



During May, Etone College is fortunate to be inviting Bali Rai in Etone College to run an author talk and some creative writing workshops with our Year 7 and 8 pupils.

Bali Rai was born in Leicester where he grew up in a multicultural community dreaming of playing football for Liverpool FC, being Bob Marley or becoming a writer. He writes the books he would have enjoyed as a teenager and Rani and Sukh is a set-text for GCSE English. His novel *Killing Honour* won the North East Teenage Book Award and was described as "utterly compelling" by The Bookseller; *Now or Never* was shortlisted for the Little Rebels Prize in 2020.
