

Leave of Absence

The Government issued new regulations in September 2013 regarding Leave of Absence; The Education (Pupil Regulations) (England) Regulations 2006 as amended by Education (Pupil Regulations) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013

- Head teachers shall not grant any Leave of Absence during term time unless they consider there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application.
- Parents do not have any entitlement to take their children on holiday during term time. Any application for leave must establish that there are exceptional circumstances and the Head Teacher must be satisfied that the circumstances warrant the granting of leave.
- · Head Teachers will determine how many school days a child may be absent from school if the leave is granted.
- The school can only consider applications for Leave of Absence which are made by the resident parent. i.e. the parent with whom the child normally resides.
- Applications for Leave of Absence must be made in advance and failure to do so will result in the absence being recorded as "unauthorised". This may result in legal action against the parent, by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.
- Applications for Leave of Absence which are made in advance and refused will result in the absence being recorded as "unauthorised". This may result in legal action against the parent, by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice, if the child is absent from school during that period.
- All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service of Warwickshire County Council.
- The Warwickshire Attendance Service have the authority to consider issuing Fixed Penalty Notices for Leave of Absence in line with the Warwickshire County Council's Non-School Attendance and Penalty Notices Code of Conduct. (A copy of which can be found at https://www.warwickshire.gov.uk/pupilnonattendance).
- If a Fixed Penalty Notice is issued and is not paid within the time-frame set out in that Notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal prosecution proceedings under S444 of Education Act 1996.

Each application for a Leave of Absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.





During the week beginning 22nd January, the Progress Report 2 Praise Assemblies took place. Teachers nominated pupils for attainment and progress within their subjects based on Report 2 data. These pupils were awarded certificates and were entered into their respective draws for a cinema voucher. Pupils with 100% attendance from November were automatically entered into the draw for an Echo Dot.


We also had a talk with a new apprentice in the company and they told us about how to get into an apprentice role and what grades they had to get to be able to get into that position.



THE GREAT TECH EXPERIENCE!

Firstly, we did a mini skills test to help us understand how to use tools. We did not go into the workshop in Year 7 so all of the Year 8's enjoyed making pendants, including myself.

Secondly, we had the privilege of having a member of Willmott Dixon come in to talk to us about the fascinating work of their employees. We also had the amazing opportunity to go to their latest project in

Leicester; a massive extension to a school! We were allowed on site, but we had to wear hard hats, hard/firm shoes and high-vis jackets. Back at school, we did a series of different activities related to this trip. Scott from Willmott Dixon taught us CAD (computer aided design) and we used this to build bridges and make a giant Tetrahedron for our final project.


I love technology and I have really enjoyed making things. I would definitely consider taking technology as one of my GCSE'S.

Food Technology

Mrs Beasley set us the task of designing a new package for a McDonald's Happy Meal. We had lots of fun making these and we got to put a variety of vibrant colours on them. We had to use different techniques to make the packaging intriguing for children. We adapted our Happy Meal boxes by using different themes.





I was shocked to discover that when a new mechanism is made, titanium dust can be used to fill a mould which is then heated to 1100°. This process only takes three hours instead of three days.

I was even more amazed when we were shown the second most powerful laser cutter in the world and the most powerful one in Europe. We were told that if it did malfunction past the many, many safety features it would be able to cut a hole into America as it has a laser capable of reaching 30,000 feet in the air. We were even told that as a demonstration of this it was used to slice a drone in half at 30,00 feet in the air!

The price of the facility is £45 million and it really does show, as we were told that their facility includes 3D printers that are not even available for the retail market yet! This shows just how much MTC are developing technology as they have items that their competitors are trying to get hold of. The milling machine cost millions of pounds and the most shocking thing we were told was that even though it is state of the art by today's standards, it will be obsolete in ten years' time.

We were also shown and taught about the many robots that MTC are developing. They have an entire side of the company dedicated to making and fixing robots. We were shown a robot that is capable of fixing another robot's component by analysing it, starting the procedure, changing its equipment and carrying on. We were told that these robots were fully portable and had even been to Tokyo to fix some equipment.

We also tried out their virtual reality equipment which was fun as we could practise spot welding without getting injured and without taking in the fumes. This showed me a whole new side of engineering as I had never seen welding before or how it was done.

The most amazing thing I learnt about was national security and how much the government invest in securing British technology from rival countries. When we were about to head into the R&D building we had to go through a high level of security checks.

This trip to MTC was a great opportunity for our class, as our eyes were opened to a lot of different areas of engineering, 21st century manufacturing technologies and the role that CAD and CAM play in the future of British companies.

Holocaust Survivor Visit

A Holocaust survivor, who was arrested by Nazis at the age of 5, visited the college's Sixth Form on Thursday 14 February.

Martin Stern MBE, 80, gave a compelling testimony about his childhood and answered a series of questions put forward to him by Sixth Form and Year 11 students.

Mr Stern later sat down for lunch with the Sixth Form's Holocaust Ambassadors and was also interviewed by S. Malek, who is writing a piece about the Holocaust for her Extended Project Qualification.

Mr Stern, said: "It was a pleasure to visit Etone College and I was received with great kindness.

"Staff and pupils were very attentive and helpful, and I was very pleased to see that both sociology and psychology are being taught."

Dr J. King, who organised the visit alongside the Holocaust Educational Trust, said: "For me, the highlight of the day was to watch the interview with Martin as it epitomised what we are trying to teach our students.

"I saw a 17-year-old Muslim girl and an 82-year-old Jewish man learning from one another. The differences of age, religion, culture and gender did not seem to matter as they discussed the importance of peace and resolutions rather than hate and violence."

Mr Mitchell, who is head of the Sixth Form department, believes that it is crucial that such visits take place in schools, as the opportunity to speak to Holocaust survivors will soon be gone.

Dr King supports this: "For young people to learn from individuals like Martin is invaluable, as it enables them to make a difference in our local communities and wider society."



Scholastic Book Fairs!

Lead Learners 2019



This January the new cohort of Lead learners has completed their initial training. This year, staff members at Etone College have nominated students in maths, English and PE to help to lead learning, support progress in lessons and to contribute to sharing good practice across the school. With nearly 80 lead learners in the cohort from year 7 to year 10, this is the largest group of lead learners we've ever had!

In the training, students looked at the power of role models and "Being the change that you want to see in the world"; we focussed on the story of Malala Yousafzai who has become an international role model and gone on to win the Nobel Prize for her work promoting access to education for all. As we learnt from Malala's story, who was shot for simply going to school, we can lead others simply by being the best version of ourselves and doing what we know to be the right thing to do, even when it is hard.

As well as looking at aspirations, the lead learners also looked at some lesson scenarios on self and peer assessment. The main focus of lead learners in lessons will be to support useful and purposeful use of green pen to identify areas for improvement and development in work.

Lead learners will also continue supporting the year 7 paired reading programme and many will continue supporting the wide range of extra-curricular activities that are on offer at the school. Some lead learners have also chosen to complete the SSAT leadership programme and will have the opportunity to complete a qualification that they can use to support future college, job or prefect applications in years to come.

Mrs Kaye-Shepheard, who lead the training, said "I'm excited to be working with such a dynamic group of students who all want to get involved in making the school experience even better! As I quoted in the training, 'A leader is one who knows the way, goes the way, and shows the way' – even when it can be challenging to do so!"

Year 7 Lunch Club

Since November a small group of Year 7 students have been attending our 'Social Dining Lunch Club'. The students get together every lunch time to make new friends and have the opportunity to play board games together. 'Mousetrap' and 'Snakes and Ladders' have been firm favourites but many have learnt to play 'Draughts' and have even outwitted Mr Astall on occasion. What is MDMA/Ecstasy (Mandy, Molly, Mitsubishis, pills, MD?

The above photos are examples of the MDMA/ecstasy tablets that are associated with the recent incident involving a young person in Rugby. These particular tablets are very dangerous as they contain high levels of MDMA (high purity). When sold in pills this type of drug is usually known as ecstasy however in powder form is known as MDMA but essentially this is the same drug. MDMA has stimulant and hallucinogenic properties.

What Are The Effects?

Onset: around 30 minutes
Duration: 2-4 hours with lingering
after- effects for up to 12 hours
Effects: there are many but in
short - increased heart rate;
euphoria; heightened emotions;
possible hallucinations; decreased
appetite and thirst; enhanced
sensations and altered sense of

Strength: on average around 125mg of MDMA per tablet (if contents known). The above tablets are known to contain around 300mg.

What Are The Risks?

Dependence: psychological dependence; it is possible to build a tolerance therefore the user needs to use more to gain the desired effects.

Withdrawal: some people experience low mood during and after the 'come down'.

Poly Use: The risks are greatly increased when used with other substances.

Other Risks: ecstasy affects the body's temperature control, so when dancing in a hot room this increases the chances of overheating and dehydration.

Content: it is often unknown what ecstasy is cut with alas the purity. This can include amphetamine, ketamine and caffeine.

Signs Of An Overdose

Signs of an overdose: may feel sick; will be unable to sweat or urinate; muscle cramps and may become unconscious.

If a user becomes unconscious place them in the recovery position to prevent choking, then call an ambulance.
